Report to the Board of Oversight

First Responder Training for Other Agencies:

All Police and Fire Departments (not otherwise licensed by the Dept of Public Health) have been required since 1978 to certify all responders in "Advanced First Aid" (understood to be a First Responder or Emergency Medical Responder certification) and CPR for Healthcare Professional within 1 year of initial appointment. This law further requires that those same responders recertify in First Aid every 3 years and CPR every one year. Currently there is only one Emergency Medical Responder certification available, which is the 56-hour curriculum from the American Red Cross.

The requirements to provide this and similar courses, and certify attendees include: Lead instructor minimum qualifications and certification, minimum instructor to student ratios, minimum training equipment, minimum training space, and incorporation as an established training site with the parent organization.

The investment in both resources and time to provide these courses have necessitated an entire industry to provide it, not unlike the existence of trade schools adjacent to their respective professions. South County EMS, along with much larger public safety agencies, contract these services to training organizations, as it is significantly more cost effective to pay another organization to maintain those standards than to try to adopt the additional duties ourselves.

South County EMS has employed people who happen to be instructors and work part time for outside training organizations. These in-house instructors have brought their expertise to our agency and other departments in our service area through a cooperative understanding, wherein South County provides the instructor hours and the education company provides the equipment, administration, and certification. As South County's responsibilities to maintain an emergency response ability increase, and the training organizations responsibilities to maintain up-to-date curriculums and equipment, this cooperative understanding is quickly becoming untenable. Additionally, with the increased scrutiny rightfully being placed on the various public safety agencies, it is imperative that their legal obligations to provide adequate and thorough training is being met.

Even if South County EMS was tasked with becoming a training organization in addition to our emergency response duties, it would not currently be an option. Aside from the significant investment in training equipment and personnel to instruct and manage the administration of programs, there are no available "Training Site" certifications available. These sites are awarded based on many factors, but the existence of many such organizations in MA has resulted in no new locations being awarded. This is assuming we would even meet the minimum qualifications without our own dedicated training facility and equipment storage.

South County EMS has always, and will always, be committed to providing education and instruction to our fellow departments. We pride ourselves in being pre-hospital emergency medicine subject matter experts, and we routinely bring this knowledge and expertise to those who can benefit from it. We are not however equipped or even the best option to provide the legal certification services to the sister agencies in the three towns. Not only would it be prohibitive for us to expand into this role, the quality of training already available locally is exceptional and does not need to be duplicated.

FY24 Budget:

The latest FY24 draft budget (v6 dated 02/16/2023) has been updated with information provided by the Town of Deerfield. Retirement costs have increased based on increases to hourly rates as well as a 6% increase to health insurance rates. Worker's Comp and Indirect Costs are both lower than previous versions. These changes result in a a total FY24 assessment to the members towns of \$726,221.

That breaks down to:	
Deerfield:	\$375,901
Sunderland:	\$228,591
Whately:	\$121,729

Write-Offs:

After a recent audit of the Town of Deerfield, it was suggested that ambulance receipt writeoffs be conducted on a more frequent basis. Currently, outstanding balances greater than 5 years old are all written off, and no debt younger than that is sent to collections. This is not atypical for other local municipalities, but is an area where more aggressive revenue chasing could be made.

The current write-off policy is extremely aggressive, and in practice seems that it would send individuals to collections that the BoO or the member towns may not intend. The Board of Oversight should review the policy and amend as necessary, or institute a means for the department and towns to respond to patients who are eventually sent to collections.

FY24 Budget presentations are scheduled for Deerfield on March 20th. And Whately on April 4th. The Sunderland presentation occurred on Monday January 30th.
